MINUTES OF THE

CULTURAL PROPERTIES REVIEW COMMITTEE

October 14, 2016

This meeting of the State of New Mexico Cultural Properties Review Committee was called to order by Chairman Rick Hendricks at approximately 1:00 p.m. on the above-cited date, in the Old Senate Chambers, Bataan Memorial Building, Room 238, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Member Richey moved to approve the agenda. Member Boggess seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES - August 5, 2016

Member Toya moved to approve the minutes as submitted.
 Member Richey seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chair Hendricks reported that since the last meeting, he signed tax credit documents and permit matters.

Member Toya moved to accept the Chair's report.
Member Richey seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER'S REPORT

Jeff Pappas, SHPO, reported the following:

Budget: The state's Division Directors will meet next Wednesday to discuss the budget decisions made at the recent special session of the legislature.

5 Year Plan: Our 5 Year Plan has been completed.

NMCRIS Upgrades: In spite of the budget cuts, we have been able to retain the \$300K for the NMCRIS system upgrades.

Historic Preservation Loan: \$415K was swept from the Historic Preservation Loan Fund to accommodate for budget shortfalls.

New Historic Sites Director: Jeff has been officially removed from his duties as acting Historic Sites Director with the appointment of Patrick Moore as the new Historic Sites Director.

Tribal Summit: HPD participated in a Tribal Summit the latter part of September which was funded through a grant by NPS. Several staff members from HPD were in attendance.

Member Richey moved to accept the SHPOs report.
 Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

SITE PROPOSALS

Official Scenic Historic Markers New Markers

The Death of Mangas Coloradas (Grant County)

Member Boggess moved to approve the text as revised:

Mangas Coloradas was one of the most highly regarded leaders among the Chiricahua Apaches. Born c. 1795, he was noted for his sagacity, diplomacy, and at 6'6" his height. He met with U.S. General Kearny in 1846 and in 1852 negotiated the only approved treaty between the Chiricahua tribe and the United States. During attempted peace talks in 1863, he was arrested and taken to Fort McLane, which stood near this site, where he was tortured and shot by guards. His skull was sent back East never to be recovered.

Member Richey seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Mary Ellen "Mollie" Hall Warren Klapp, Homesteader (1862-1933)

Eighty-million acres of public land in the West were in private ownership by 1900 through the 1862 Homestead Act. New Mexico drew hundreds of settlers who built homes and farmed 160-acre allotments in pursuit of a better life. Mollie Klapp was one. Born in Illinois, by 1900 she was widowed in Oklahoma with seven children when she decided to move to Moriarty, a "pinto bean capital of the world." The Estancia Valley is well-suited to dryland farming and helped New Mexico become the nation's fourth largest pinto bean producer by 1916 when 2.5 million pounds were harvested. Mollie farmed, taught school, and remarried. Here hard life led to institutionalization at the state mental health hospital in Las Vegas where she worked as a seamstress and housekeeper, and died from "exhaustion".

Member Boggess seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

New Mexico Historic Women Marker Initiative (tabled from previous meeting)

Florinda Naranjo Ortiz

Member Richey moved to approve the text as revised:

(Side 1)

Revistas, Maromas and Carpas

Trapeze and juggling acts, song, dance, and dramatic performances were part of traveling vaudeville-style shows called *revistas* that brought fun and entertainment to families throughout New Mexico in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Many were family based and included acrobatics, or *maromas*, performed under a small tent, or *carpa*- the name by which they were sometimes known. Originating in Mexico with roots in Aztec culture, they often presented humor reflecting cultural differences between Mexican-American and Anglo traditions. Most ended with the onset of WWII.

(Side 2) Florinda Naranjo Ortiz 1900-1939

Born in the one-time coal town of Dawson, Florinda Ortiz was part of a family-based *carpa* known as La Compañía Hermanos Ortiz, which toured the Southwest in the early twentieth century. With her husband, Jose Ortiz, and five children as performers, Florinda sang blues songs like "St. Louis Blues" and acted in comedy skits, while her husband performed magic acts dressed as *El Gran Payaso Tamborín* (Tambourine, The Great Clown). She was also a healer, selling herbs on her travels. Generations of her children became musicians and singers.

Member Boggess seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Doña Elena Gallegos, (Bernalillo County)

Member Boggess moved to approve the text as revised:

(Side 1)

Doña Elena Gallegos was a daughter of early seventeenth-century Hispanic colonists, Antonio Gallegos and Catalina Baca. They fled New Mexico with their newborn daughter during the 1680 Pueblo Revolt but returned in 1692. Elena wed Santiago Gurulé, a tattooed Frenchman, born Jacques Grolet, a member of the ill-fated La Salle expedition. Everyone with the Hispanized form of his surname, Gurulé, has roots in New Mexico. Approximately two years after her husband's death in 1712, Captain Diego Montoya conveyed to Elena the vast landholding that has since born her name.

(Side 2)

From the crest of the Sandia Mountains to the Rio Grande Valley lies the Elena Gallegos Land Grant. It covered 70,000 acres, approximately the northern half of Albuquerque up to Sandia Pueblo. The extent of the grant—some felt its eastern border was the foothills—was uncertain until a nineteenth-century court interpreted the word "sierra" in the original document as the crest of the mountains. The adjudication helped make it possible to preserve part of the land grant as open space and provide a picnic area for the enjoyment of all.

Member Richey seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Emiteria "Matie" Martinez Robinson Viles, (San Miguel County)

Member Boggess moved to approve the text as revised:

(Side 1)

Orphaned as a child in Golondrinas, "Matie" would forever feel a special benevolence toward orphans. She lived with her grandparents after the death of her parents, and later moved in with Elizabeth and Isaiah Robinson in Mora where she tended Elizabeth's health. Matie married George A. Viles in 1908. When he found work at a lodge near Cowles, Matie packed their belongings on two buckboards and navigated rough terrain to help him manage it. In 1930, the couple bought Mountain View Ranch, a dude ranch patronized by East Coast investors who gave him financial advice.

(Side 2)

When George died in 1950, Matie thought she did not have enough money to pay for his funeral. He had kept secret a fortune amassed through his investments. Upon learning from his lawyer of her sudden wealth, Matie

wanted to help children. She established the Viles Foundation in 1959 to provide scholarships for higher education to orphans and youth in San Miguel and Mora Counties. On its fiftieth anniversary, the Viles Foundation announced it had granted more than \$2 million to 852 students statewide, many achieving great success.

Member Toya seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

New Mexico Historic Women Marker Initiative (reviewed by subcommittee)

Dona Teresa Aguilera y Roche, (Santa Fe County)

Member Boggess moved to approve the text as revised:

(Side One)

Doña Teresa was the aristocratic, educated, and outspoken wife of New Mexico governor don Bernardo López de Mendizábal. Both were accused as sorcerers and Judaizes, Christians who practiced Jewish rituals-and brought before the Holy Office of the Inquisition in Mexico City. Arrested in the Palace of the Governors on August 26, 1662, they were forcibly taken from Santa Fe to Mexico City. Held for two years, her husband died in prison, but Teresa, in a spirited defense, exposed her accusers' malfeasance, saying they had acted out of greed and envy. The case and her testimony give insight into life, society, and the political and religious institutions of colonial Santa Fe. Teresa's case was suspended in 1664 due to lack of credible eyewitness testimony.

(Side Two)

New Mexico Historic Women Marker Initiative

The New Mexico Historic Women's Forum in a statewide effort to recognize women's contributions to New Mexico history on the state's Official Scenic Historic Markers. The Initiative ensures that women's diverse histories will be remembered and told, and will inspire and provide a guide for future generations. The 2006 Legislature funded the project.

Member Toya seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Susan Parks (Luna County) 1895-1981

Member Boggess moved to approve the text as revised:

(Side One)

Susan "Susie" Parks operated the telephone switchboard in 1916. She and her husband, Garnet, owned and published the *Columbus Courier* newspaper and

lived in back of the office on Broadway Street. Susie, alone with her infant daughter, Gwen, awoke in the early morning of March 9 to gunshots and shouts of, "Viva Villa!" Pancho Villa's army was raiding the village. Susie bravely withstood the gunfire, using her switchboard to summon National Guard troops from Deming. Susie and Gwen were wounded by glass and fragments of bullets, but both survived the attack.

(Side Two)

The New Mexico Historic Women Marker Initiative was founded in 2005 by members of the New Mexico Women's Forum in a statewide effort to recognize women's contributions to New Mexico history on the state's Official Scenic Historic Markers. The Initiative ensures that women's diverse histories will be remembered and told, and will inspire and provide a guide for future generations. The 2006 Legislature funded the project.

Member Toya seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

*At 2:57 p.m. Chair Hendricks called for a 10 minute break. The meeting resumed at 3:11 p.m.

Revised Historic Markers

Bayard (Grant County)

Member Purvis moved to approve the text as revised:

Bayard Station was first called Hall's Station, a depot on the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe, serving a tuberculosis sanatorium at nearby Fort Bayard, which was named after Brigadier General George Dashiell Bayard. A settlement grew around the depot and became Bayard when a post office opened in 1902. But people lived here long before including the Mogollón and Mimbres people. Warm Springs Apaches introduced Spaniards to the area's abundant copper deposits by 1801, and in 1910 open-pit mining began at nearby Santa Rita, eventually consuming that town. Many of its residents—and their Santa Rita homes—moved to Bayard.

Member Boggess seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

Trinity Site (Socorro County)

Member Richey moved to approve the text as revised:

The nuclear age began with the detonation of world's first atomic bomb at the Trinity Site on July 16, 1945. The site may have been named Trinity by J. Robert Oppenheimer, director of Los Alamos Nuclear Physics Laboratory, who said at the blast, "Now, I am become Death, the destroyer of worlds," quoting from

the *Bhagavad Gita*. The detonation of the bomb marked the culmination of the Manhattan Project.

Member Boggess seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

SUBCOMMITTEE MATTERS – Tax Credit Projects

Member Richey reported that the Architectural Subcommittee got together this morning and looked at project files and photos. Staff and applicants answered questions about the submittals. After reviewing the material and memorandum, Member Richey offered the following motions:

For Part 1s

Member Richey moved to approve the Part 1 application for the 1013 Manzano Court, NW, Albuquerque.

Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

- ★ Member Richey moved to approve the Part 1 application for 609 Cooper Street, Silver City. with the following conditions:
 - Masonry work is approved for credit
 - Removal of front door closest to street and its replacement with a window is not approved and, if undertaken, no credit will be granted for overall project. Door may be fixed in place, covered at the interior, and (non-historic) knob and lockset may be removed. Steps to front door to remain.
 - Specific proposals including contractors' written estimates and comparative scale before-and-after details of windows must be submitted to staff prior to construction for:
 - o Window replacements
 - o Wood Trim
 - o Ceiling Work

Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

- Member Richey moved to approve the Part 1 application for 727 Don Gaspar Street, Santa Fe with the following conditions:
 - If ridge vents are used, they must be shingled over to maintain same appearance as roof
 - No ventilation turbines may be added to roof. Soffit vents and ridge vents are recommended instead.

Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

- Member Richey moved to approve the Part 1 application for the Anna Kaseman House, 1420 Las Lomas Road, NE, Albuquerque with the following conditions:
 - Removal and replacement of Elm trees is eligible for credit
 - Further trimming of dead wood from street trees is not eligible as it is recurring maintenance (credits given once for trimming of those trees in 2013) and typical for old Elms.

- Recommend consultation with arborist, tree surgeon or City Forester about condition of the trees and recommendations. Recommend using larger replacement trees.
 Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.
- Member Richey moved to approve the Part 1 application for 2515 Vista Larga Avenue, NE, Albuquerque with the following conditions:
 - A revised and detailed proposal is to be submitted to staff prior to construction. It must include:
 - Exploration of roof and soffits (including core samples, and removal of sections of GWB soffit) be submitted to staff
 - o A scale plan diagram showing:
 - Roof drains held back from perimeter of roof, close to the walls of house
 - No scuppers or 2x4s to be added to perimeter of roof
 - EPDM, TPO or other waterproof roofing membrane
 - Tapered board underlayment to slope water to drains (optional)
 - Removal of the GWB soffit covering and extant wood soffit is to be rehabbed/replaced
 - Fascia stripped back to wood construction and single metal facing installed

Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

- Member Richey moved to approve the Part 1 application for 2000 Silver Avenue, SE, Albuquerque with the following conditions:
 - Stucco at top and face of parapets to be cut back sufficiently to avoid bulge
 - Waterproof membrane such as Bituthane or Ice and Water Shield to be installed over parapets
 - Lath, cementitious stucco to be installed with crown seal applied
 - New stucco to maintain same wall plane and parapet level as existing
 - Top of parapets to taper or be rounded back toward roof to shed water

Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

- Member Richey moved to approve the Part 1 application for 1224 Fruit Avenue, NW, Albuquerque, with the following condition:
 - If roof vents are installed, they must be shingled over.

Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

- Member Richey moved to deny the Part 1 applications for the following properties:
 - 11 Pool Street, NW, La Luz del Oeste, Albuquerque (Proposed work is periodic or routine maintenance. They received credit previously for re-roofing.)
 - The Kathryn Higgins House, 1701 Silver Avenue, SE, Albuquerque (Does not meet program standards re removal of character-defining historic features without deterioration-beyond-repair)

• 601 Eleventh Street, NW, Albuquerque (Does not meet program standards re removal of character-defining historic features without deterioration beyond repair)

Member Purvis seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

- Dr. Riggs would be approved by the CPRC to be listed on the project specific permit staff roster as the supervisory archaeologist or principle investigator.
- It would require a research design
 - SHPO and CPRC request this should integrate the long term management goals of the historic site
 - Curation would be with MIAC, New Mexico Historic Sites (NMHS)
 currently has a curation agreement with MIAC to address this
 - Include a schedule for reporting on field work
 - Preliminary report within a month
 - Final report within a year
 - Subsequent project specific permits will not be issued until final report is submitted
 - Consider effects of the proposed research design (adverse, no adverse/remedial)
 - Test outside listed limits/boundary of site

- Test previously excavated areas to bring modern methods of excavation and analysis and remediate effects of previous work
- Permit term would be specific to the dates of the field school
- Check with UNM archaeology board for clearance to do work since the property belongs to UNM
- Do tribal consultation early in the process
