Personnel Announcements:

Derek Pierce submitted to SPO in pay-band raises for four (4) ARMS employees. Paperwork for additional HPD in pay-band raises will be forthcoming

NMCRIS Upgrade/Update:

The second deliverable is about to be approved by HPD; IGIS will submit the third of five deliverables by the end of September; hopefully wrap up the planning phase of the upgrade project by December 2018, and begin the RFP process for the implementation. Thanks to Derek Pierce, Scott Geister, especially, for their work with the subcontractor.

HPD Preservation Grants Program:

Starting in July 2019, HPD will be offering a preservation grants program funded by the National Park Service at \$50K. Staff will be meeting in short order to determine the scope of the grant program.

Tax Credit Program Update:

El Vado Motor Court (federal tax credit project); possibly a successful Part 2 application for the Castaneda Hotel in Las Vegas; Gretchen Brock training/assisting Harvey Kaplan. Possibly a third and fourth Federal Tax Credit projects are coming as well, Madrid and Cimarron. Note the uptick in tax credit projects. Thanks to Harvey and Gretchen for their work.

Preservation Project of note:

The Cavern Theater in Carlsbad, Facebook post by Karla McWilliams spotlights the City of Carlsbad "undertaking a rehabilitation project of the theater to make it into the City of Carlsbad, Cavern Theatre Performance ArtCentre." New Marquee for the Cavern Theatre was also installed bringing some new life and light to Downtown Carlsbad.

HPD UNM Partnership:

Students from UNM's certificate in Historic Preservation program are working on projects around the state. Kelly Davis is working with the Historic Santa Fe Foundation. Ted Weber is designing an interpretative landscape for the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum. Laurie Fioror is working with Steven Moffson on a National Register listing for The Henge, a sculpture at Don Anderson's home in Roswell. Special thanks to Reginald Richey for assisting with the project. Steven Moffson, Karla McWilliams, and Lynette Pollari participated in a DOCOMOMO planning meeting with the UNM School and Architecture and Planning. Steven and Jeff are again under contract to teach the required methodology course at UNM this spring.

Special Project with Georgia O'Keefe Museum:

Lynette Pollari and Pilar Cannizzaro have been working with the O'Keefe Museum assisting in the design for a new park in Abiquiu, just below the O'Keefe Residence.

2018 Archeology Fair - Jemez Springs, NM

The fair was held at the Jemez Historic Site with 510 attendees. Thanks to Michelle, her staff, the staff of the Jemez Historic Site, and many partners for such a great day.

SITE PROPOSALS

State Register of Cultural Properties and National Register of Historic Places

Davis Mercantile (Roosevelt County)

The Davis Mercantile is significant at the local level under National Register Criterion A in the area of commerce because the mercantile provided everyday goods, farm and ranch equipment, gasoline, and postal services to rural residents of southern Roosevelt County and parts of West Texas. The Davis Mercantile is significant at the local level under National Register Criterion C in the area of architecture because it is an excellent representative example of a rural 20th-century mercantile that includes shelves and counters that line the interior, living space above, and an island in front for gasoline pumps.

- Member Bandy moved to approve the nomination for listing on the State Register and forward to the keeper of the National Register.
- Member Boggess seconded, and the motion was passed unanimously.

Willard Mercantile (Torrance County)

The Willard Mercantile is significant at the local level under National Register Criterion A in the area of commerce because the mercantile provided farm equipment, oil and gasoline, and household goods to rural residents of Mountainair and Torrance County. The Willard Mercantile is significant at the local level under National Register Criterion C in the area of architecture because it is an excellent representative example of a rural 20th-century mercantile, which retains its original storefront, open plan, and pressed-metal ceiling.

- Member Richey seconded, and the motion was passed unanimously.

Main Library (Bernalillo County)

The Main Library is significant at the state level under National Register Criterion C in the area of architecture because the library, designed by Albuquerque architect George Pearl of the firm Stevens, Mallory, Pearl, and Campbell, is an excellent example of Brutalism, a style of architecture popular in the 1960s and 1970s that emphasized monumental forms built of brick and especially concrete. The Main Library is significant at the state level under National Register Criterion A in the areas of community planning and development and politics/government because the library was a central component of urban renewal plans in Albuquerque in the 1960s and 1970s that reshaped downtown to include Civic Plaza, a new city hall, police department, convention center, and the demolition of blocks of so-called blighted buildings. The Main Library is significant at the state level under National Register Criterion A in the area of education because it incorporates late-20th-century scientific principles of library design and because it represents the city's commitment to public educational institutions in response to the population boom in the decades after the Second World War. The Main Library meets criteria consideration G because it achieved significance within the last fifty years and is of exceptional importance.

Replacement Markers/Revised Text

Dawson/Dawson Cemetery (Colfax County)

(SIDE 1) Dawson

Dawson was established in 1901 by the Phelps Dodge Corporation and named for the former landowner and rancher John Barkley Dawson. At its peak it was the largest mining town in New Mexico with a population of more than 6,000. The workers were mostly immigrants from southern and eastern Europe and Mexico. The company, built houses, two schools, two churches, a hospital, store, hotel, bank, and cemetery. Recreational facilities such as ball fields, a pool, golf course, and amusement hall were also constructed. The town was abandoned and razed when the coal mines closed in 1950.

Maria Josefa Jaramillo Carson (Taos County)

(SIDE 1)

María Josefa Jaramillo Carson

1828-1868

A descendant of Spanish settlers, Josefa Jaramillo was born in Potrero in 1828 to a prominent family. She was baptized in the Santa Cruz de la Cañada Church in Santa Cruz. In 1843 she married Christopher "Kit" Carson, the famous frontiersman, expedition leader, and Army officer. Carson was often away for years at a time, leaving Josefa to manage their large family and home in Taos.

(SIDE 2)

During the 1847 Taos Rebellion, while Kit Carson was away, Josefa escaped an attack at her brother-in-law Charles Bent's house by digging a hole through an adobe wall leading into an adjoining dwelling. Kit Carson retired from the U.S. Army in 1867, and the family moved to Boggsville, Colorado. Josefa died on April 23, 1868, a few days after the birth of her ninth child.
